


Getting ready for Christmas A message for Mary

Have you ever been asked to do something really difficult? I wonder what helped Mary to do what God asked her to do?





Paper Angels

You will need:

- A piece of A4 paper
- Ribbon, wool or string
- A large bead

- Scissors
- Hole punch





Cut the piece of paper along the long edge, about 1/3 of the way down. Now cut the thinner strip in half. Fold all three pieces in a concertina pattern, backwards and forwards. Using the hole punch to make a hole in the end of each of the concertina pieces. Thread the ribbon or wool through the holes, small piece first, large piece second, other small piece third. Thread both ends of the ribbon through the bead and tie in a large, tight knot. The bead will be the head. Spread out the wings and the angel's gown. Tie the ends of the ribbon together to make a loop so you can hang your angel up.



Christmas Cards

You will need:

- Thick paper or card
- Pens/pencil crayons

Optional

- Glue
- Decorative stickers, paper, glitter
- Scissors

Fold your paper or card in half and decorate the front to make a Christmassy picture. Perhaps you could send your card to someone who won't be able to get to church this Christmas.

Building Challenge


Can you build a 3D map of the road Mary and Joseph took to Bethlehem? What buildings or landmarks might they have passed on the way?
